Other observances may include Indigenous People's Day, Breast Cancer Awareness Month, and National Hispanic Heritage Month (which ends on October 15).

Fall Reminders for Wolfe Pointe Residents

Culvert & Drainage Maintenance: As we enter leaf season, please inspect your driveway culverts for debris and sediment. Leaves and buildup can block water flow and cause flooding. If needed, have your culverts cleaned and regraded to ensure proper drainage.

A reminder: do not plant trees or shrubs in roadside ditches or outfall swales. These areas are vital to our stormwater management system and must remain clear and functional. Wolfe Pointe Garden Committee (WPGC): The newly formed WPGC will soon begin meeting to discuss maintenance and improvements to our landscaped areas. Visibility & Safety During Shorter Days: With earlier nightfall and the upcoming time change, visibility is reduced. If you're walking or biking on our roads or pathways, please wear light-colored or reflective clothing and carry a flashlight so motorists can see you. Also, help keep our streetlights effective by trimming vegetation around light poles. Overgrown screen plantings near transformers can block light intended for the roadway. RJ Keller
